

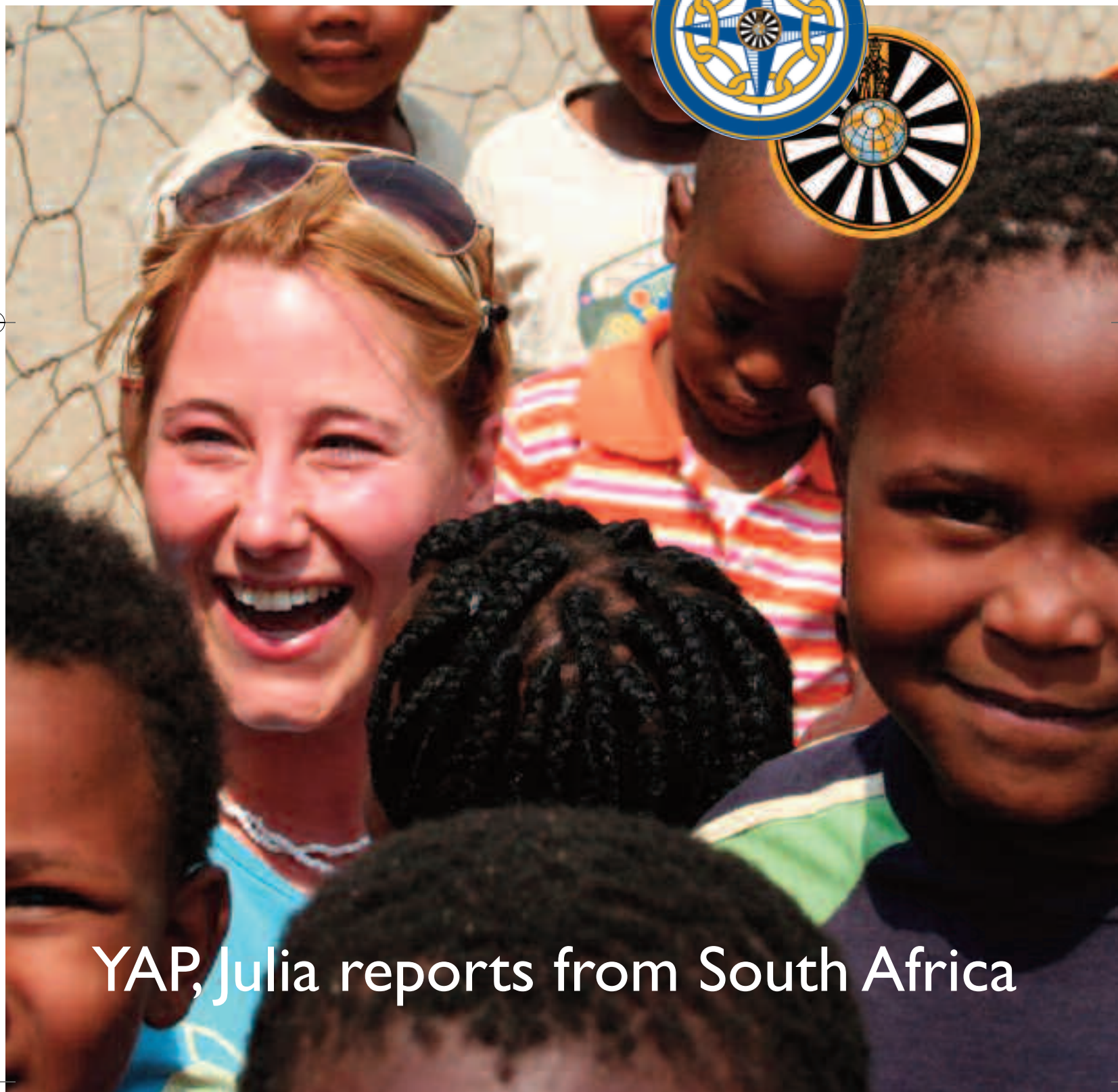

Up to the present, our Members have had little or no opportunity for presenting their ideas concerning the future advancement of Round Table. Hitherto, for reasons of economy and expediency, it has been necessary for us all, once given the basic ideas of the Movement, to work out our own conceptions of them. Round Table, however, will not thrive upon the work of any single individual, or, indeed, upon that of any small group of individuals, but only by an exchange of ideas of the entire membership. Hence our Bulletin. Our future, as a Movement, depends entirely upon the proper assimilation and subsequent expression of our Objects by all who undertake to uphold them. We use the word „undertake“ advisedly, for Membership of Round Table is not merely belonging to a Table club; it is a personal acknowledgment to the Community; of one's responsibilities throughout life. Being of the Community, living in it by the exercise of our different vocations, it behoves all Tablers to do their bit for it. Not a mere spasmodic effort, but a continual sustained one in our daily round and common task.

It is to be hoped that Members will inundate the Editor with their contributions to these columns, contributions that will reflect the thoughts of the Nation's thinking Youth, that will be helpful to the Movement itself, and productive of ideas that will conduce to the best of understanding between followers of all vocations. Let our first object be to spread ourselves Worldwide. Your Editor's policy it might well be announced at the outset. In the positive Sense, all contributions that present any business or Professional matter of interest will be gladly accepted; all contributions that would appear to conduce to a better understanding in the Community, will find these pages open: In the negative sense, contributions appearing to encroach upon the tenets of any particular Faith or Political Party will be taboo. Our International Rules will be strictly adhered to in these columns. Any controversial matter suggesting competition with, or derogatory to, any similar existing Organisation, will be destined for the rubbish dump. We may run with some, on the same permanent way, though in a different compartment, and it is up to us to keep that permanent way (the permanent way of Vocational Service) in good repair, that we may travel smoothly and in safety. Let us always in these columns, lend an attentive ear to the voice of age and experience; let us be, in truth, the link between each passing generation and each new. Let it be our aim to pass on

this world of affairs, in which we are entering the richer for our efforts. Such is Progress.

This report is a translation from a paper sent to the German Homepage by Hans-Dieter Gesch, OT 18 Wiesbaden and the German OTD - IRO

The HYM 4I International, takes place always in Autumn and after going to Zambia last year we were invited across to far away „Clubs 4I Indian Ocean“ on the island of Mauritius.

It is known that the HYM is no meeting where major decisions may be decided like at the AGMs.

Therefore the HYM a good forum for many sharing of ideas and discussing amongst the International Delegates present. There were various ideas about Rule changes, their disadvantages or advantages. However a full days official meeting did take place, but not only that it was possible to have many discussions during the 3 or more days that the Delegates were present, this enables us to get to know „new“ 4Iers that maybe attending their very first International event and of course meeting up with our old known friends. „Deepening the Friendship“ but it did not end at

the Meeting, instead continued into the Bars, Pools and on the Golf course. Anywhere, where the spirit of Round Table was casually found.

Presentations, spoken, discussed new and old issues that the 26 Delegates from 16 Associations, directed by Randolph Riedlinger the International resident from Meran/Merano (this place is so beautiful they gave it two names)

Italy, helped and perfectly organised by the 4I Secretary and Treasurer Bob Parton OT 46, Past President OTD Germany ably assisted by Past President from GB John Bellwood and Past President 4I Club and 4Ier Austria Dieter Straka, they presented the following full detailed reports on their activities over the last few months. On this front Randolph Riedlinger touched upon the theme about organisation for AGM and HYMs and recommended to all Associations to appoint an officer as Event-Managers, an advisor for the Tables that have to prepare such meetings (because non of us are professional at this job) With such a man in office we could avoid a lot of frustration and unfortunate mistakes.

Randolph added to an Elegant Gala Dinner in our fine evening dress it is not correct to have to stand and queue at a Buffet

Every Association gave a report over the activities in their own countries over the last few months.

Bob Parton as Treasurer reported that the Balance showed a healthy surplus and that

nearly all Associations had paid their fees. He thanked the Associations for the generous free-willing donations that they had paid along with their Fee Invoices for The Hinge magazine. He then presented his Budget for 2009 – 2008 which was unanimously accepted by the Delegates. Bob Parton has also made provision in his Budget for a possible new Member to join the Board bringing the total Board members up to 5. This Budget showed no increase in the fee structure although he hopes for more income due to the extra clubs that have been opened in this year.

He hopes to avoid having to put on a “Fuel Surcharge” onto the Invoices when they go out next May; however we think he was only joking when he said this.

The dilemma with Holland unfortunately continues where Bob Parton reported about continual non-Payment from our Netherland friends. They never react to any prompting or pushing. This is particularly disappointing because in RT the club in The Netherlands is very strong, in fact next August in

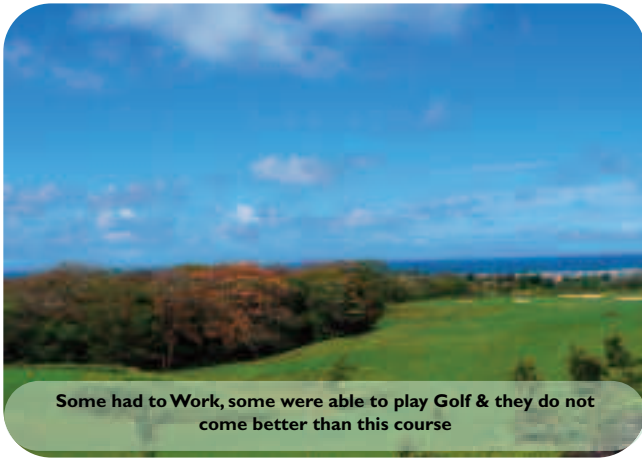

scheme in action as "saviour" to the Dutch club and asks that no hasty decision be taken until he has chance to finish his actions. We should give him this time.

41 International is growing, not only the Associations, but also through other countries like Nepal, Uganda, Estonia, Poland, Iceland and in Spain with the Iberian Cluster and Barcelona all showing much interest and opening new clubs.

The Board are to present in Gloucester an Resolution whereby we shall try to reduce the ridiculous time it takes to get decisions made which in some cases 2 years pass before a positive decision can be made for a favourable change that would assist the development in 41 World wide.

The Germans want to have Managers voted in by the delegates and given a limited period of office which is probably long overdue and could also bring advantages to our Club. The future President for 41 International 2012 - 2013 will be Jean-Louis Boileau, from Club 78 Libourne - Saint Emilion, in Region 6 Gironde, gave a short presentation. Yes, this is Jean-Louis who stepped down in 2003 in fairness to 41 Club International due to private difficulties and let Alain de la Bretesche take his appointment. Jean-Louis now returns, he, since 1982, has been a staunch Round Tabler, national President Club 41 Francais in 2000-2001 with splendid English knowledge. "Nous verons bien" ed.

Dieter Straka wants to bring in single club members into our Associations, those that have less than three clubs, this would be without a voting right but at least they could attend and be heard.

As always the Host of the Next meeting, the AGM in Gloucester „Forest of Dean“ made a short presentation, with full Majestic glory, in a ghastly yellow, whereby John Bellwood said it was green T-Shirt.. (Fortunately no-one noticed

that the Secretary sat on the top table in shorts) The Meeting will take place on 25.04.2009 with a pre tour into the Lake District and the beautiful Cotswolds.

The next HYM will take place in Switzerland at Sursee this will be 24.10.2009.

With these two "cheap" events for the French/Swiss and German Associations they should be able to reduce their Capitation Fees next year, be aware fellow Tablers.

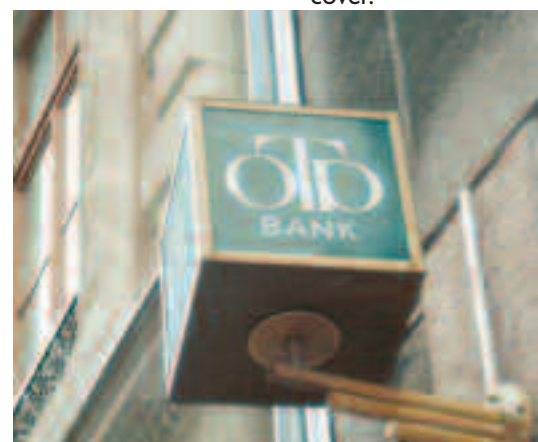

GERMANS



Class:

Germany does not have a class system any more. The old distinctive class differences have been levelled out since World War II. Nowadays nearly everybody belongs to the same class, which by English stratification could be roughly described as upper-lower-middle-middle class. A small but significant number of German aristocrats does exist, but like their English counterparts they keep themselves very much to themselves, hiding their wealth, land and influence with an un-German-like lack of show, many even sending their children to English boarding schools.

Not every "von" denotes aristocracy; that of the so-called "vegetable nobles" only means "from", as in "from the village of". German aristocratic titles correspond to the British ones in name only. Unlike the British tradition of leaving the title just to the oldest son, aristocrats in Germany pass on the parental title to all children. Now as Germany used to consist of 300 independent states, each with its own upper class, noble names have always been plentiful. Intermarriages with commoners can spread the name across all class barriers, especially since after a divorce the commoner is entitled not only to keep the title, but to pass it onto future spouses and children as well, who will also....etc.

This accounts for the astonishing abundance of titles in Germany today. It is all part of a crafty scheme devised by the state to bring about such an inflation of nobility (at least in name) that eventually titles will become so common, they will be meaningless.

Being Green:

The Germans worry about the environment. Green economics and green politics are much more developed than in Britain, where the Green Party has only slightly more credibility than the "Monster Raving Loony Party".

This particular preoccupation is founded on real concern. Industrial pollution is a major problem, much of it coming downstream in the Rhine, a river so full of chemicals that someone once managed to develop a photograph in the water taken from it.

The state of many of Germany's rivers is something of an own goal. Before reunification they exported most of their toxic wastes to Eastern Germany, where a great deal was dumped unceremoniously into the nearest river, only to flow back into Western Germany.

But what really made the Germans really sit up and take notice was the "Waldsterben", the dying of the forests. The beloved forests gave the Germans a jolt they have yet to recover from. Forests, even if seldom visited, exert a powerful influence on the Germans. They are regarded as the natural habitat which most shaped the German soul. It was from the forests they emerged to rampage across Europe and lay waste to Rome 2000 years ago and it is from the forest that they return (in spirit at least) when modern life overwhelms them with its horrors and demands.

Even today, around 30% of the land is covered with woodlands, and entering them gives the Germans a thrill of danger missing from their ordered urban life. The German forests are primordial and awesome. Their crisis is a crisis for the German spirit.

The Germans are keen recyclers. There is no shortage of opportunity to sift their green bottles from their brown, their plastic from paper. At supermarkets, people can discard the packaging and leave it behind altogether. Manufacturers of white goods (fridges, ovens) nowadays make efforts to see that the parts and materials they use can be recycled.

Green concern and the commercialism that surrounds it leads to some absurd situations. The scrupulously separated waste is quite often thrown together again when it reaches the dump, and none of it is recycled.

And the demand for recycled paper is so great that the mills have to pulp perfectly good new paper to make it!

The Germans do not mind these imperfections in the system. Recycling is a beautiful idea, and that's what really counts.

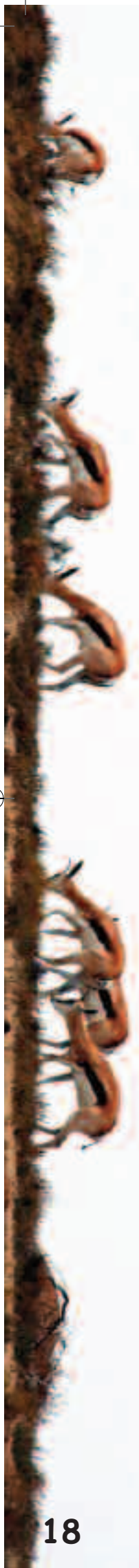

Florence is really good at taking pictures and she gets the chance to capture quite a few very impressive images, just like a cute lion baby trying to catch Steve's flipflops, or an even cuter rugbyplayer kicking the *Cheetahs* into the semi-final.

We have made friends, and we are grateful to all who made this experience possible, also to Ulver Oswald from Germany for his background work.
