



Raschid. known to so many in the room, reminisced of his time at the helm. Typically, and as thoughtful as ever, he spoke caringly about the absence of a dear friend and member of the hosting club who had undergone a major operation in the previous few days which had laid him low. Raschid had prepared a very large card and asked those present to sign it to convey our very best wishes for recovery.

Barry Johnson, Past High Sheriff of Lancashire and Past Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Lancashire who proposed the toast to the Red Rose.

Oxford College Dinner based each time in an Oxford College.

The last of these was in 2017 when it became obvious that costs were escalating, numbers were dwindling, and nobody was coming forward to organise it.

Having not had a dinner in 2018, there was a call from the Region for something to occur as many missed the annual occasion to get together for fun and fellowship.

New National Councillor Dave Chard sought views as to what was wanted and found that there were many negatives on an evening function in the centre of Oxford.



Trying to get to a college in the centre of Oxford on a Friday night from far flung places seemed



to be the paramount problem with difficulties in parking and having lengthy travel back late at night. The request for a lunch was tabled.

So, the Oxford College Lunch was born. Isis Area 41 Club formed a committee chaired by past National President Mike Fitchett, and we made plans for the first 'Oxford College Lunch' in St Hilda's College in Oxford. This took place on November 16th. The college was not a 'Hogwarts' but still produced a quality and comfortable venue, on the banks of the River Isis at a price which made it more viable.

This could have been a 'gamble', but in the

end it really worked! Over 90 members attended on a cold but sunny day. There was good wine

at a reasonable price, speeches by National President Andrew and a Guest Speaker – the owner of a family business in Wales – who entertained us with some of the amusing incidents in his life. The day was full of excellent fellowship, with good food and wine, and it also managed to raise over £1,000 for the President's RNLI charity!

The general consensus seems to be this is the way forward for the future. Isis Area 41 Club appear to be prepared to host this again next year and the venue is ideal for the numbers we would expect. The room will take 120 so there is room for this to grow.

### ASHBY 41 CLUB ON TOUR AGAIN

Budapest in Hungary was the destination for the latest Ashby de la Zouch 41 Club International trip over the weekend of 8th – 11th November. A record total of 15 travellers, consisting of 10 41ers, 2 Tablers and 3 friends – too many to name individually! We could have increased that by a further three 41ers had they



been able to make the selected weekend.

And what a weekend we had! Arriving around lunchtime on the Friday, we checked in to our hotel in the city centre and set off in search of lunch (and beer). Prior to the trip, we had researched local bars that served craft beer, and Jónás Craft Beer House was our destination. Unfortunately, the address on the website was out of date, necessitating a brief pit stop in another bar before continuing on a slightly longer walk to its new location. But it was worth it, with a good selection of very drinkable beer available.

We decided that steak was the requirement for the evening meal, and Pampas Argentin Steakhouse was selected. Amazingly, they had a single oval table that was large enough for us all to sit at. Note that most are wearing their 41 Club polo shirts.

There's probably no need to detail the rest of the evening, suffice to say that we enjoyed a

good meal before moving on for after-dinner refreshments, where we were introduced to palinka, the traditional Hungarian fruit brandy. Just trying it once was enough for some of us (but not all...).

Saturday was sight-seeing day. Budapest is a lovely city, with a lot of stunning buildings, and of course the river Danube running through it, separating the two



parts of Buda and Pest. Unfortunately, it was an overcast day (it was November after all), but our time was limited and rain was forecast for Sunday, so we pushed on.

Váci Utca is one of the main pedestrian streets in Budapest, containing many shops, bars and restaurants. We walked along to Vörösmarty Square at the northern end of the street, where the Christmas Market was already open. A bit early in the season perhaps, but a good opportunity to browse and eventually try some of the wide range of food on offer for lunch. But nobody tried what was on the sign shown above!

We had booked a Craft Beer Cruise for the afternoon (is there a theme here?). The cruise lasted 90 minutes, during which time we could enjoy the sights of Budapest whilst tasting several local beers (the weakest of which was 4.8% and the strongest at 7%). One of our Tablers, Charlie, even found his own beer!

Despite the overcast weather, we enjoyed seeing the sights along the banks of the Danube, complete with commentary. One of the most



impressive was the

Parliament building, modelled on our own Palace of Westminster.

By the end of the cruise, the rain had started and barely let off until Sunday evening. We did just have to see the iron shoes on the bank of the Danube, created in memory of the Jews who were killed on that spot by the fascist



Arrow Cross militia during the Second World War. Very sobering.

We had done well up to this point keeping all fifteen of us together. However, this was soon to change, with people being separated into smaller groups for various reasons. It didn't matter though – we were keeping in touch with a dedicated WhatsApp group – and the party was split between two restaurants that evening.





The next day was Remembrance Sunday, so everybody made sure they were wearing their poppies. Because of the rain on Sunday, we decided that a bus tour of Budapest would be a good idea, as we would be able to keep dry on board and still see some of the sights at least through the rainy windows. First stop was the Citadel in Buda, from

where (on a good day) there are spectacular views of the city. Well, we could see what they mean, even on a day like today...

Fifteen arrived at the Citadel stop on the bus, but only twelve left - oops! Our next bus stop was the Castle, where we took a small electric bus up the hill. The Euro is not the primary currency in Hungary, it's the Forint, and with 400ft to the pound, we were getting used to dealing with some pretty high numbers when we asked for 15 of everything! The numbers seemed so high, we even offered to buy the bus! But at least we were able to secure some good discounts on several occasions with so many of us.

Evening entertainment consisted of a few more bars, including one of the so-called 'ruin'

bars. This was called Red Ruin, with humorous wall decorations of communist figures and a picture of Lenin with a Mohican! An excellent meal was had at the Central restaurant just two doors down from our hotel.

Our final day on Monday dawned bright and clear, a nice change.

Our bus tickets were valid for 48 hours, so we decided to redo the trip so that we could see the city in a different light (literally). The bus took us out to Heroes Square, which was laid out in 1896 to honour the 1000th anniversary of Hungary's formation by the seven chieftains of the Magyars. Here we disembarked as there was a lot to see and appreciate.



The next two buses were full, so we decided to return to Vörösmarty Square using the M1 Metro line. One of the 41ers had had his eye on this beforehand, being a bit of a train buff (okay,

it was me!). This line is the second oldest in Europe (after London) and has attractive small stations and old trains.

Back in the square, we had time for coffee and cake, individual wandering for shopping etc, before heading back to the hotel for our airport transfer.

Everybody had a great time, including our three guests, and we all got on well with each other. There is no doubt that fellowship is alive and well in Ashby 41 club, and we look forward to doing it all again in 2020. Cheers!

### 2020 41 Club Motorcycle Weekend

I am pleased to announce the date for <u>the 2020 41 Club Motorcycle Weekend</u>, which will be from Friday 10th July to Sunday 12th July. The meeting will be based at the Dragonfly Hotel in King's Lynn, where we have reserved rooms for Bed, Breakfast and evening meal. The tariff we have negotiated is £55 per person per night assuming 2 people sharing either twin or double room i.e. 2 people sharing a room, £220 for the weekend. If you require a single room, the single rate is £75 per night.

You will need to book direct with the hotel, I will confirm details for this soon as you will need a code to quote to get the discounted rate. The rooms will be held for us until **June 11th**, so you must book before this date to get the rate. Booking after this date will cost quite a bit more, and rooms might not be available - we are not blessed with suitable large hotels locally, we have provisionally reserved 17 twin rooms and 5 doubles. We are still arranging details for the itinerary which will be outlined soon, the format will be broadly similar to the 2019 event held in Hinkley, welcome/dinner/fellowship on Friday evening, ride out and activities on Saturday, evening dinner/presentations/speeches (short!!), ride out on Sunday morning with a lunch somewhere before saying our farewells. We will have a relatively small registration fee to cover up front expenses, and whilst we may be able to negotiate some discount for entry to places we visit, we ask that each participant covers the entry fees themselves on the day. More news soon, along with a registration form.



In the afternoon we continue through the picturesque countryside and rural villages before returning to the hotel.

On the Sunday we will be doing a Dickens tour finishing in Rochester. We will travel on country lanes along the Saxon Shore Way visiting the area which was featured in many of Charles Dickens novel's including the graves at Cooling which was the setting for Great Expectations. Visiting a bird sanctuary, one of Europe's major migration sites, which over 300,000 birds use with panoramic views over the marshes and the River Thames.

We finish in the historical City of Rochester with its Castle and Cathedral which is the second oldest in England.

We have arranged with the hotel for an extra night for those who wish to visit other parts of Kent. The hotel is about 50 miles from Dover for the ferry or Folkestone for Eurotunnel. Also Ebbsfleet is about 15 minutes from the hotel where members can take a day trip via Eurostar which has trains to Paris, Brussels or Lillie.

As George Bernard Shaw once said, "The single biggest problem in communication is the illusion that it has taken place"... well, if anyone has wrestled with the 'group mailing feature' of the existing and crumbling 41 Club Administration System (CAS) - they'll completely agree!

National Councillors around GB&I regularly send out 'block emails' to the Clubs within their Region and receive positive response messages back from CAS such as "650 emails sent out; Successful delivered emails = 650; Undelivered emails = none"....


Whereas in truth it would be more accurate if they read "Successful delivered emails = most or some, maybe"; Undelivered emails = some, possibly, not sure"...

CAS is the National 41 Club system and database that stores all Club and member details, manages National capitation, and (should) enable group emails to be shared with Regions, Clubs and individual members across the organisation. It's problem is that it's very old, creaking, doesn't share information with the 41 Club website, support for the technology it was written in expires at the end of December this year - and the tablets of stone that Moses wrote the original code on have long perished..

SO - a brand new system is being developed using new technology that is so shiny, it will make your eyes squint when you look at it... Fear not however - an important part of the new design is to ensure members feel comfortable with using it so there will be familiarity with the 'look and feel' of much of the system - but behind the screens, every shiny new cog will run smoothLy using well-oiled hinges...

Work is now underway 'cleansing' and migrating across all of the existing data from the current system to the new one and the first phase of the new system (creatively to be called CAS 2) is scheduled to be released in January 2020 with future phases being released in the next 3-4 months. Then work will begin on revising and updating our website.....Clubs will receive full information from the Comms & IT Officer Don Mullane early next year.





### YAP - Young Ambassadors Program 2020



Last year GB&I joined the YAP program and, for the first time this year, 3 of our young people have been on tours to North India, South India and South Africa.

Next year we will continue to be involved and have the opportunity to send young people that are children of 41ers on tours/programs as well as receive young people from other countries to GB&I to experience life here.

### REQUIREMENTS TO BE A YAP-PARTICIPANT

- You should be between 18 and 24 yrs old and a child/grandchild of a 41er.
- You will be asked to pay your flight ticket, your transfer and administrative fees.
- You should be capable of giving a presentation about your country in English and, in so doing, act as a young ambassador.

### Before departure:

- Send all forms digitally to your National Convenor and to the International YAP Convenor. (Application, Guest letter including photo)
- · Send Proof of Medical and Liability Insurance.
- · Pay the administration fee (in €)
- After your return, you are expected to deliver a report to your National Board and to your club's Media.

Tours are available to North India, South India, South Africa, Cyprus, Southern Europe and Northern Europe. All tours take place between late May and September.

Any young people wishing to apply should visit the YAP website https://yap-famex.org for more information and also to get a copy of the application form etc. These should be completed and returned to Andy Ventress IRO, international@41club.org and also Christoph Haenssler, Interna-tional YAP Convenor, chaenssler@bluewin.ch.

For the first time, in 2020, GB&I will be expected to host young people for a number of days. I am therefore looking for clubs that would be interested in hosting.

A club would be required to home host the young people for 2/3 days/nights. There will be approximately 12 youngsters in the group. They will need to be hosted in in 4 to 6 homes hopefully with a young person of a similar age.

### **DUTIES OF A YAP-HOSTING CLUB INCLUDE:**

- Making sure all participants of the YAP-tour have a host family.
- · Assumption of all costs for room and board and entrance-fees.
- (The costs of transfers from club to club are covered by the YAP tour fee)
- Ensuring that the YAP participants have the opportunity to learn more about your country, region or town.
- Informing your guests about the characteristics of your region by organising sightseeing tours, visits of busi-nesses and factories and by showing them RT/ 4ler projects.
- Coordinating group transports with the hosting clubs in charge before and after you.
